FREEDOM TO LIVE ON A HEALTHY PLANET	Mostly yes. "We need every tool to help us reduce waste, clean the air and produce renewable energy." Also supports biomass energy and nuclear energy.  Voted against requiring net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2045.	Environment Should addressing climate change be a top priority?	Mostly no. Opposed a bill addressing climate change. Opposed a carbon tax.  Supported incentivizing farmers to use renewables. Sponsored a bill fostering climatesmart farming. In 2014 said climate change didn't cause California drought.
	Increase. Voted to require community and employment benefits in new clean energy projects. Secured funding for workforce training at a growing community college.  Supports overtime pay for farmworkers and state budget funding for infrastructure.	Economy Decrease or increase government investment in, and regulation of, the economy?	Mixed. Opposed two bipartisan bills funding infrastructure and boosting domestic manufacturing. Supports spending more to deal with drought. Supported a short-term suspension of a gas tax and a community project funding bill.
FREEDOM FROM HARM	Mixed. Voted to ban firearm marketing to minors. Voted to enable police seizure of ghost guns from people with restraining orders. Voted against a ban on manufacturing firearms without a state license. Voted against tightening the permit application process.	Gun Laws Loosen or tighten gun regulation?	Loosen. Opposed banning assault weapons. Opposed raising the legal age for gun purchases and criminalizing gun trafficking. Voted against expanding background checks.
	<b>Expand.</b> Opposes "discrimination against LGBTQ Americans." Voted to protect the privacy of people receiving gender-affirming care. Voted to require trans-inclusive healthcare training.	<u>LGBTQ Rights</u> Limit or expand rights for LGBTQ+ people?	Mixed. Opposed anti-discrimination protections for LGBTQ people. Supported recognizing same-sex marriages. Voted to ensure equal credit opportunities for LGBTQ businesses. Supported banning trans girls on girls' sports teams.
	Introduced a bill to <u>fund</u> hiring police in their own communities, to bring <u>trust</u> between the community and the officers. Introduced a bill <u>helping prevent</u> hiring police with a misconduct history, to hold them "accountable" and "root out bad cops."	Criminal Justice How to ensure effectiveness and fairness in law enforcement?	<u>Voted against</u> addressing racial profiling and use of <u>deadly force</u> . <u>Supports</u> funding de-escalation training and mental health services for police, so they "know they have our support." <u>Supports</u> providing childcare to deal with a police shortage.

FREEDOM TO BE HEALTHY	Increase. Would work to lower drug costs and insurance premiums. Supports the Affordable Care Act and wants to expand Medicare. In 2020 voted for California to produce its own medications, like insulin, more affordably.	Health Care Increase or decrease government support for health care?	Mixed. Says the Affordable Care Act "failed" and would ensure "health care remains in the hands of" the "doctor, not the government."  Sponsored bills funding hospitals in underserved communities and asthma care.
FREEDOM TO LIVE IN A WELCOMING COUNTRY	Mixed: Supports better securing the border and revising the asylum process. Believes in "a pathway to citizenship" for "law-abiding" people. Supported a bill making non-citizens who meet certain requirements eligible for election to a Democratic county central committee.	Immigration Defend the right to asylum and support a path to citizenship for DACA participants brought to the U.S. as children?	Mixed: Supports <u>comprehensive</u> reform by <u>combatting</u> illegal immigration and creating "a <u>fair</u> process" for earning citizenship. <u>Supported</u> bills providing <u>paths</u> to legal status to <u>Dreamers</u> and <u>farmworkers</u> . <u>Voted</u> <u>to tighten</u> border security.
FREEDOM TO PARTICIPATE IN A VIBRANT DEMOCRACY	Mostly easier. Would "protect the right to vote for all Americans" while preventing "voter fraud." Voted to continue California's universal vote-by-mail system. Voted against allowing convicted felons to register and vote while on parole.	<u>Voting Rights</u> Make voting harder or easier?	<b>Harder.</b> Supports <u>bolstering</u> "election security." Sponsored a bill <u>requiring</u> voter photo ID and <u>banning</u> Washington, DC from mailing out ballots. <u>Voted against</u> <u>expanding</u> voting access.
FREEDOM TO CARE FOR OURSELVES AND OUR FAMILIES	Easier. Is "proud to stand in solidarity with" the California Labor Federation, which endorsed him. Supported bills protecting faculty bargaining rights, giving farmworkers more ways to vote in union elections, and giving family childcare providers the right to unionize.	<u>Labor</u> Make it easier or harder for unions to organize?	Mostly harder. Opposed expanding union organizing rights. Supported ending a rail shutdown by voting for an agreement between unions and management, but opposed a related bill giving railroad workers seven sick days.
	Yes, but unclear how much. Calls \$7.25 "low." In 2013 voted to gradually raise CA's minimum wage to \$10 per hour by 2016. Did not vote on a 2016 bill to raise it steadily to \$15 in 2022.	<u>Minimum Wage</u> Raise federal minimum from \$7.25/hour?	No position found.
	Support. Voted to increase awareness of the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program for community college faculty. Supported an effort to increase the number of Californians accessing loan forgiveness programs.	Student Financial Aid Support lowering interest on student loans and/or forgiving them?	<b>No.</b> <u>Voted to repeal</u> Biden's student debt forgiveness plan. <u>Voted to</u> end the pandemic student loan payment pause.
	<b>No recent position found.</b> In 2019 <u>voted</u> <u>to increase</u> tax rates for Californians making \$1 million and above.	Taxes Raise or lower taxes on corporations and wealthier individuals?	Lower. Voted for the 2017 Trump tax cuts that included the largest corporate cuts in U.S. history and major tax cuts for the wealthy. Voted to rescind \$45.6 billion in funding that would enforce the tax code for businesses or households making over \$400,000.
