

## **Protecting SNAP: Talking Points**

NETWORK urges all lawmakers to resist any new cuts to SNAP, so-called "restructuring," or additional work-reporting requirements that are just pretenses for slashing the benefits that our communities need and deserve.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is our nation's most important tool for preventing hunger for families and children.

- No matter what we look like, where we live, or how much money is in our wallets, we all deserve to eat nutritious food.
- 42 million people in the United States rely on SNAP to eat.
  - In our state, \_\_\_\_\_ of our neighbors rely on SNAP to prevent hunger for themselves and their families.
- But even with the SNAP program we have today, **47 million** people in the U.S. still face food insecurity, including **9.4 million children**.
- These numbers are inexcusable and immoral.
  - o Grounded in Gospel teaching, we believe that all people have the right to the basic essentials we need to live—and food is the most basic of all.
  - Hunger is a moral issue for all of us. People of faith and all people of goodwill agree that no child or family should go hungry, especially in the richest nation in the world.

## And, SNAP does more than put food on the table.

- **SNAP helps the economy.** Studies demonstrate that every \$1 in SNAP benefits creates more than \$1.50 in economic activity.
- SNAP is a lifeline for our rural communities.
  - o Rural areas have the highest proportions of SNAP participants.
  - Farmers and food workers need the economic stability that SNAP provides, especially in hard times.
- SNAP improves our nation's health, education, and economic self-sufficiency.
  - SNAP participants have fewer hospitalizations, lower health care costs, and a reduced need for other forms of public assistance.
  - Children with SNAP benefits are at lower risk for developmental problems, child abuse, and neglect, and have better educational achievement outcomes.



### Yet, some Republicans in Congress are dangerously threatening SNAP.

- These lawmakers want to cut the Thrifty Food Plan, which is the bipartisan, basic formula for setting benefits. This would harm all 47 million people who need SNAP.
- They want to take away states' flexibility in awarding benefits, and "restructure" SNAP to force states to pay for the program instead of the federal government.
- They want to create even more red tape with more work-reporting requirements, even though those requirements were just increased last year. More work-reporting requirements will punish people like:
  - o A grandmother who cares for her grandkids so their mom can work full-time;
  - Individuals with severe health problems struggling with endless delays in their disability applications; and
  - o Gig workers with unstable employment opportunities.

#### These cuts make no sense because:

- SNAP is already limited to our neighbors with the greatest need.
  - o 92% of SNAP benefits go to households at or below the poverty line.
- SNAP benefits only cover a subsistence diet.
  - Even though food inflation has skyrocketed and still rises, the average SNAP benefit is just \$6.20/day per person.
- SNAP already has strict eligibility rules, including work-reporting requirements.

# Any cuts to SNAP will be devastating for our communities and for individuals, families, and children living in or at the edge of poverty.

- Our local soup kitchens and food banks are already overwhelmed and cannot handle further cuts to SNAP.
- Cutting SNAP will result in higher government costs for health care, education, and social services.
- Cutting SNAP will increase poverty and instability in our country and make food less accessible to our families and communities. This is immoral.
